Puppies cannot see or hear when they are born because their eyes and ears are closed. Their eyes and ears will open when they are 3 weeks old.

A puppy's coat may change color as they age. Some puppies are even born with green fur! This may be caused by surrounding liquid while they are in their mother's belly.





Puppies lose their baby teeth too! Puppy teeth begin to grow at 3 weeks of age and finish by 8 weeks. Between 3-6 months, puppies start wanting to chew as their adult teeth come in.

It's important for puppies to socialize and play because it teaches them how to act around other pets and people. Puppies can also begin learning simple commands like "sit".





It is important to housetrain puppies to teach them when and where it is appropriate to take a bathroom break.

Puppies will need to visit the veterinarian to receive vaccines and heartworm medication. Vaccines are given to help protect puppies from catching certain diseases.





A puppy is no longer a puppy when they reach one year of age. However, they may continue to grow until they reach 18 months. Certain breeds grow faster or slower than others.

Infants/Toddlers

Puppy Sounds

Materials: computer/tablet, videos of puppies

- Introduce your child to what puppies sound like!
- Start by asking your child if they know what sound a puppy makes. Tell them puppies go "Woof!" and let them practice making the sound with you.
- Search online for videos of puppy sounds. Have your child practice their listening skills and mimic the puppies in the video.

Puppy Texture

Materials: pictures/videos of puppies, stuffed animal or soft object

- Introduce your child to what puppies feel like!
- Let your child pet a stuffed animal or soft object to demonstrate to your child what a puppy feels like.
- Some adjectives you can share are "soft", "smooth", "fuzzy", "furry", "fluffy", and "warm".

Puppy Vocabulary

Materials: paper & pencil, crayons/markers/colored pencils

- Make spelling fun by introducing new words related to puppies! Some words include: puppy, dog, paw, bark, fur, tail, nose, ears, and snout.
- You can have your child practice on paper with a writing tool, or you can get creative by having them practice tracing the letters in sand, using alphabet magnets, or using letter stickers.
