Word of the Day: Wellness Exam

A wellness exam is also known as a **check-up**. Pets who visit the veterinarian have a wellness exam to make sure they are healthy. This is different from when a pet needs to visit the vet because they appear sick or injured.

It is important for pets to have a wellness exam at least once a year. People also need to visit the doctor for a wellness exam or check-up every year to make sure everything is normal and help prevent against possible disease or illness.

Stethoscope

Stethoscopes help vets listen to an animal's heart and breathing.



Scale

A scale is used to measure how much an animal weighs.



Thermometer

Vets use a thermometer to take an animal's temperature.



Needle

Sometimes, vets will draw blood or give a vaccine during an exam.



Otoscope

Otoscopes help vets look inside of an animal's ears.



Hands

Vets use their hands while wearing gloves to examine a patient.

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What do veterinarians look for during a wellness exam?

A veterinarian will check different body parts on a pet during its wellness exam. Each body part is examined to make sure it is healthy and working properly. Read below to learn about what a veterinarian looks for during a wellness exam.

Eyes



A vet will check to make sure the eyes are clear. Eyes should not be red or leaking.

Nose



A vet will check that the nose let's the pet breathe easily. The nose should not leak.

Mouth



Vets shouldn't smell bad breath! Teeth should be clean and the gums should be pink.

Lungs



A vet will use a stethoscope to listen to a pet's breathing.

Limbs



A vet will check to see if the pet is limping and that the arms and legs move correctly.

Ears



A vet will check that the ears are clean and clear with no smell or redness.

Throat



A vet will rub the throat, or neck, to check for lumps or any pain.

Heart



A vet will use a stethoscope to listen to a pet's heartbeat. **Click on the heart to listen!**

Stomach



A vet will rub the abdomen (where the stomach is) to check for lumps or any pain.


Body Covering



A vet will check to make sure the pet's fur, feathers, scales, or skin are clean and healthy.

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Activities

Note: Be sure to emphasize to your young one that a wellness exam for your family pet should only ever be performed by a veterinarian. If your child would like to pretend to be a veterinarian, a stuffed animal or toy is a fun and safe way to practice their clinical skills!

Infants/Toddlers

Heads, Shoulders, Knees & Toes

Materials: stuffed animal or pet

- It's always fun to sing Heads, Shoulders, Knees, & Toes, but you can do so with a twist! Have your child sing along with you as you point out the head, shoulders, knees, and toes of your pet or stuffed animal.
- Challenge your child to identify the different body parts on the animal.



PreK - 3rd Grade

Practice Wellness Exam

Materials: clipboard, patient chart, stuffed animal, toy vet tools

- Help your child practice their very own veterinary wellness exam by letting them follow along the Patient Chart on page 3.
- Introduce the different tools used to do a wellness exam from page 1 and demonstrate how they are used. Then, let your child practice on a stuffed animal. If you don't have toy tools, this can be a fun opportunity for you and your child to craft some homemade veterinary instruments at home!
- Make it interactive listen to the sound of heartbeats online as you check the "heart", or the sound of breathing as you check the "lungs".
- Take the time to discuss the wellness exam with your child. You can ask them questions, such as:
 - Why are you checking the eyes/ears/nose? What are you looking for?
 - What might a sick pet look like? Sound like? Smell like?
 - What might a healthy pet look like? Sound like? Smell like?
