Animal Medical Center Oncologist Dr. Ann Hohenhaus Appointed to the World Small Animal Veterinary Association Oncology Working Group

Only Seven Global Experts Selected

(June 16, 2021 – New York, N.Y.) The Animal Medical Center (AMC) announced today that Dr. Ann Hohenhaus, Diplomate, ACVIM (Small Animal Internal Medicine and Oncology), Oncology Staff Doctor, has been selected for the World Small Animal Veterinary Association's (WSAVA) newly formed Oncology Working Group. Dr. Hohenhaus joins an elite group of veterinary oncology specialists from around the world tasked with raising awareness of advances in cancer therapy and promoting best practices within the field.

One in four dogs, and one in five cats, will develop cancer in their lifetime, and the need to raise the standard of care in veterinary oncology is critical. The WSAVA Oncology Working Group is developing accessible global guidelines for veterinary oncology practice and will produce practical tools to help the veterinary community improve standards of treatment, along with educational materials for pet owners about cancer.
