


BARBIE GIRL

- 11/2 oz pisco
- 3/4 oz crème de cassis
- 1/2 oz fresh lime juice Luxardo cherries. skewered on a cocktail pick, for garnish

In shaker, combine drink ingredients. Fill with ice and shake vigorously for 15 sec. Strain into cocktail coupe and garnish with cherries.

THEY'RE GOOD SLEEPERS
